# **Prescription**

Study of the basic elements and procedures of common practice tonal music, including basic training in harmony and counterpoint, aural perception, and keyboard skills.

# Course learning objectives (CLOs)

Students who have successfully completed this course will be able to:

- 1. add counterpoints in all five species to a given cantus firmus
- 2. harmonise a non-modulating melody for four-part choir using diatonic chords including seventh chords, and secondary dominants
- 3. identify by ear the basic properties of intervals, chords, and keys, and compare simple performances with the written score
- 4. use the keyboard to play simple pieces, transpositions, score readings, and improvisations.

# **Teaching format**

This course comprises one 1-hour lecture and one 2-hour lecture per week, and one 1-hour tutorial per week. Class participation will be an important part of students' learning. There will normally be exercises to complete and/or music to listen to before each class, and these exercises/listenings will form the basis for discussion and questions. During tutorials, a graduate tutor will guide students in discussing course content, as well as providing help with aural skills and keyboard skills.

### Workload

A 20-point one-trimester course should require at least 200 hours' work (including class time). This means that during the trimester, the mid-trimester break and study week you should be prepared to spend, on average, 13 hours per week involved in activities such as attending classes, reading, listening to recommended recordings, practicing keyboard skills, and preparing assignments.
