Prescription

Advanced study of a selected topic within music.

2016 offering: An in-depth study of music created in response to war and suffering, with emphasis on composers who were persecuted during and/or have conveyed the horror of World War II and the Holocaust.

Course content

A detailed week-by-week syllabus will be supplied at the first class.

Course learning objectives (CLOs)

Students successfully completing this course will be able to:

1. evaluate, at an advanced level, the various theoretical approaches and performance issues relevant to the approved musical works
2. critically explain and evaluate the social, cultural, historical, and musical issues present at the time of the Second World War
3. generate and present new advanced critical work about music, employing advanced skills in scholarly research, academic writing, and performance, if relevant.

Teaching format

The class will be run in a seminar style, led by the lecturers but with active participation expected, with discussion of set reading materials, and student presentations later in the course.

This course comprises one 3-hour lecture per week.

Mandatory course requirements

In addition to achieving an overall pass mark of 50%, students must:

- a) attend at least two Music Forum seminar presentations in the trimester the course is taught.

Rationale: This requirement develops crucial skills in listening, engaging with, and critically assessing research presentations.

Students who are concerned that they have been (or might be) unable to meet any of the mandatory course requirements, because of exceptional personal circumstances, should contact the Course Coordinator as soon as possible.

Workload

A 30-point one-trimester course should require at least 300 hours' work (including class time). This means that during the trimester, the mid-trimester break and study week you should be prepared to spend, on average, 20 hours per week involved in activities such as attending classes, reading, listening to recommended recordings and preparing assignments.

Total: 300 hours. Class attendance: 36 hours (12 lectures); Reading and listening: 140 hours (14 weeks x 10); Assignments: 112 hours (14 weeks x 8); Six journals: 12 hours.
