Prescription

Further development of the knowledge and skills required for intermediate-level jazz improvisation using standard jazz language.

Course learning objectives (CLOs)

Students who have successfully completed this course will be able to:

1. demonstrate knowledge of the theory and application of the principles of jazz improvisation to an intermediate level
2. apply prescribed elements of the jazz language to a jazz improvisation
3. play improvised solos over standard forms at a range of tempi using post-bop jazz vocabulary and rhythmic devices appropriate to their instruments
4. transcribe, notate and perform improvised solos from a given recording.

Teaching format

This course comprises one 1.5-hour lecture per week.

Mandatory course requirements

In addition to achieving an overall pass mark of 50%, students must:

- a) pass all items of assessment specified for this course, with a minimum of 50%, on or by the specified dates

Justification: Improvisational skills are central to all jazz learning and a thorough grasp of the principles is essential to all aspects of jazz performance.

- b) attend at least 80% of lectures, tutorials and workshops related to this course unless absence is due to verified medical reasons or advance permission for absence has been given by the teacher/lecturer.

Justification: The learning in this course is experiential and accumulative and absences from class may result in the student being unable to keep up with the work.

For performance courses assessed by recitals, an aegrotat cannot apply. Instead, the student (with the written approval of the teacher and the Programme Leader, Jazz) must apply to the Director NZSM to have his/her assessment delayed. Any such delayed assessment must be completed prior to the start of the following trimester.

Any student who is concerned that they have been (or might be) unable to meet any of the mandatory course requirements because of exceptional personal circumstances, should contact the course coordinator as soon as possible.

Workload

A 15-point full-year course should require at least 150 hours work (including class time). This means that in term time, the midterm break and study week you should be prepared to spend on average 5 hours per week involved in activities such as attending classes, reading, listening to recommended recordings and preparing assignments.
