# Prescription

This course will introduce students to some central questions in bioethics. Topics covered may include the ethical issues associated with assisted reproduction, severely disabled newborns, euthanasia, informed consent, human cloning, stem cell therapy, radical life extension, and intellectual enhancement.

# **Course learning objectives (CLOs)**

Students who pass the course should be able to:

- 1. demonstrate an in-depth understanding of bioethical ideas
- 2. critically evaluate a variety of bioethical arguments
- 3. analyse or elucidate complex bioethical ideas and concepts.

# **Teaching format**

The twice-weekly meetings will include some lecturing, plus discussion, informal group assignments, and time for questions. There are no tutorials for this course.

Students are expected to attend classes regularly, take part in class discussion, and keep up with the reading.

Week 8: Human Genetic Enhancement: Caplan and Arp, Part 11 (Nick)

Week 9: Patenting Genes and Embryos (Nick)

Week 10: Abortion: Caplan and Arp, Part 4 (Felice)

Week 11: Reproductive Cloning: Caplan and Arp, Part 3 (Nick)

Week 12: In Vitro Fertilization: Caplan and Arp, Part 14 (Felice)

#### Workload

The essays and examination will be evaluated against the following five criteria:

- 1. directness and clarity in answering the question
- 2. support of answer with relevant and reasoned argument
- 3. knowledge of relevant material presented in readings and lectures
- 4. consideration of alternative viewpoints and arguments
- 5. quality of writing, including clarity of handwriting where relevant.

### Submission of work

Essays must be submitted electronically to Blackboard; a hard copy is not required.

Late submission of **assignments** will **not be accepted** unless the student makes an appointment as soon as practically possible with the course coordinator to explain the lateness (preferably before the assignment is due to be submitted).
