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Prescription

Examines the interplay of religion, law and politics in the contemporary world. Themes include: relationships between religion and politics, religious freedom, religion and conflict. Case studies explore different religions focusing on current debates, including the role of religion in contentious legislation and in forms of political violence.

Course learning objectives (CLOs)

Students who pass this course should be able to:

- 1. identify distinctive religious strands which have shaped the polities of NZ and other western societies;
- 2. critically interpret current religious or religiously charged controversies, including (but not restricted to) legal protection of religious freedom; war, peace and violence; and gender and sexual politics, from the perspective of the interrelationship of religion, law and politics;
- 3. read, summarise and analyse a range of literature in the disciplines of religious studies, law and political science.

Teaching format

The course is delivered by means of one 2-hour lecture per week, and 9 tutorial sessions scheduled throughout the trimester.

Mandatory course requirements

In addition to achieving an overall pass mark of 50%, students must:

- 1. **make a credible attempt at the major essay**, in order to demonstrate achievement of CLOs 1-3:
- 2. sit the final class test, in order to demonstrate achievement of CLOs 1-3;
- 3. **attend at least seven of nine tutorials**, in order to a) develop critical understanding of the religious issues addressed in the course and b) receive adequate preparation for course assessments.

Any student who is concerned that they have been (or might be) unable to meet any of the MCRs because of exceptional personal circumstances, should contact the course coordinator as soon as possible.

Workload

For 20-point one-trimester courses, 200 hours over the trimester are recommended. An average student should spend 13 hours per week for preparation, reading and writing in addition to attendance at lectures and tutorials.

Submission and return of work

All assignments must be submitted in hard copy to the assignment box outside the Religious Studies programme office (KP 14 203).

The essay must be submitted in electronic form on Blackboard, AND also to the assignment box. Electronic submission via Blackboard alone is not sufficient. Marked work can be picked up from the programme office approximately two weeks after submission date.

Extensions and Penalties

Extensions

Essays submitted late due to medical or personal reasons must be given to the programme administrator accompanied by a certificate from a doctor or other professional. If students require an extension, this should be arranged with Dr Troughton prior to the relevant deadline.

Penalties

A penalty of 1% per 24 hours may be deducted for essays and assignments that are submitted late, without a prior arrangement for extension. After 14 days, essays may still be accepted, but students should not expect to receive comments on their work from the marker.

Set texts

There is no set textbook or course reader. All readings are made available to students electronically, via Blackboard.

Class representative

The class representative provides a useful way to communicate feedback to the teaching staff during the course. A class representative will be selected at the first lecture of the course.

Student feedback

All student feedback from course evaluations is considered, improvements are regularly made on that basis: for example, extensive use of Blackboard for all course materials and the requirement for regular small pieces of assessment have been implemented on the basis of student feedback. Students responded positively to course content and delivery.
