Prescription

An exploration of the role of religion in promoting conflict and terror, and of the power and potential of religion for transforming conflict and building peace. There will be a particular focus on the distinctive historical, theological, symbolic and practical resources religious communities can offer to the task of peacemaking in a violent world.

Course content

Course learning objectives (CLOs)

By the end of this course, students should be able to:

- 1. Critically analyse contemporary discourses about religious violence and religious peacemaking
- 2. Develop and hone analytical skills in the comparative analysis of religion
- 3. Articulate nuanced arguments that draw upon and deploy empirical and theoretical knowledge about religion
- 4. Demonstrate critical thinking and communication skills relevant for academic research

Teaching format

This course is taught by means of one two-hour lecture per week and 9 tutorial sessions scheduled throughout the trimester. The lectures communicate historical, theoretical and doctrinal materials, while the tutorials allow students the opportunity to develop their own communication skills through critical discussion of the readings and lectures. Students are expected to read the assigned readings prior to both the lecture and tutorial. Please check Appendix A for the relevant topics and readings for each week.

Mandatory course requirements

In addition to achieving an overall pass mark of 50% students must attend a minimum of 7 out of 9 tutorials. Tutorial attendance is necessary for demonstrating the achievement of all CLOs in the course. Any student who is concerned that they have been (or might be) unable to meet any of the MCRs because of exceptional personal circumstances, should contact the course coordinator.

Workload

For 20-point courses a student should, on average, spend 13 hours per week for preparation, reading and writing in addition to attendance at lectures and tutorials. The total workload for the course, including class time, should be approximately 200 hours.

Assessment

All essays should be written in clear language and should contain a coherent, structured and organised argument. Essays should conform to referencing practices as laid out in the Chicago Style for the Humanities, including a correctly formatted bibliography. A document providing guidance on referencing will be uploaded to Blackboard. All essays will be submitted to the plagiarism-detection software Turnitin.
