Prescription

This course focuses on political movements and policies that seek to regulate sexuality and sexual conduct. Classes require critical reading and discussion of classic and contemporary texts on the following topics: sexuality and self; marriage, love and romance; commercial sex; sexual violence; sex and moral panics; sex and media

Course learning objectives (CLOs)

Students who pass this course will:

- 1. Use classical and contemporary social theories to analyze political debate and social policies relating to sexuality and sexual conduct.
- 2. Select a topic related to sexuality and/or sexual conduct and discuss it in relation to themes from classical and/or contemporary social theories.
- 3. Develop a theoretically informed argument on a topic related to sexuality in well-structured academic prose.

Teaching format

The course will be taught in a seminar format with one 2-hour class per week over trimesters 1 and 2 (24 total). The seminars will focus on participatory discussion of weekly readings.

Mandatory course requirements

There are no mandatory course requirements.

Workload

The expectations are that students will work 10 hours per point, therefore a 30 point course equates to 300 hours over trimester 1 + 2 including scheduled contact time of 2 hours per week.

Preparing reading responses: 20 hours

Developing a topic and preparing to lead class discussion: 30 hours

Writing the final essay: 50 hours
