Prescription

This course presents a range of literary works by Spanish writers, studied in their original Spanish versions, and aims to introduce students to contemporary approaches to memory in literary and cultural criticism. Specific attention will be paid to the recent focus on recovering the past in modern Spanish literature.

Course learning objectives (CLOs)

Upon completing the course successfully students will be able to:

- 1. demonstrate a critical understanding of the different theoretical and methodological approaches which are prevalent in contemporary Peninsular Spanish literary and cultural studies;
- 2. demonstrate an understanding of different themes and issues relating to memory that are recurrent throughout the spectrum of 20th Century Spanish culture;
- 3. examine and interpret in spoken and written analysis a wide variety of contemporary literary and cultural texts from Spain.

Teaching format

This course is delivered through two lectures and one tutorial per week. The lectures will focus on the primary texts that are studied in the course, including discussion of the socio-political contexts relevant to these works and aspects of contemporary literary criticism. The tutorials will focus on the development of

analytical skills through discussion of the primary texts and other set readings, and will also be used for the presentation of student seminars.

Workload

The University Assessment Handbook has laid down guidelines as to the number of hours per week which students are expected to devote to a course in order to maintain satisfactory progress. Students enrolling in a 30-point, 300-hour course should work on average 20 hours per week including contact hours- i.e., in the case of SPAN 405, **17 hours of private study outside class time**. Some students will find they need to do more than this, especially if they are aiming to achieve high grades. A possible distribution of study time each week would be:

Class and tutorial attendance 3 hours
Reading and reviewing class notes 6 hours
Tutorial preparation 4 hours
Study for final exam and reading for essays 4 hours

Assessment

Assessment for SPAN 405 consists of 60% internal assessment and 40% examination assessment as follows:

Marking criteria for each piece of assessment will be communicated in class and on Blackboard.

Submission and return of work

Tidy presentation is essential. Work may be typed or neatly handwritten. Crossings-out indicate that a piece of work is still at draft stage. Allow space for corrections: leave a 4-centimetre margin and write or type on alternate lines. Do not write in pencil.

All assignments should include a cover sheet available from SLC office. Assignments are to be handed in to the Spanish and Latin American Studies assignment slot located to the left of the SLC Office area on the 6th floor of von Zedlitz. Detailed guidelines for the presentation of essays will be distributed with the essay topics. Marked work will either be returned in class or be made available for collection from the SLC office. Please bring your student ID card with you when you come to collect your work.

Extensions and penalties

Extensions

Short extensions may be granted by the Course Coordinator for particular assignments if requested in writing prior to the hand-in date. Longer extensions will require appropriate supporting documentation.

Penalties

The due dates for the assignments given in the Course Programme *must* be adhered to. Although work may be accepted late in special circumstances, the Course Coordinator should always be contacted on or before the due dates if there is a problem. The penalty for work presented late without prior approval is a 5% deduction per day.
