Prescription

Focused on key episodes of cross-cultural encounter throughout the history of art, this course introduces students to questions of difference and continuity through consideration of significant artworks and practices. The course incorporates aspects of New Zealand, Māori and Pacific art into a broader history of contact and change.

Course learning objectives (CLOs)

Students who pass this course should be able to:

1. understand key episodes of cross-cultural encounter and artistic exchange within the chronology of a global art history;

2. analyse and interpret the dynamics of artistic influence and change within contexts of crosscultural encounter

3. gather and organise relevant information and evidence from artworks and published material (i.e. secondary sources) and to further their ability to construct an argument using this material;

4. present material which is coherent and well-written and which demonstrates an understanding and application of the conventions of academic writing (including appropriate citation, referencing and documentation).

Teaching format

ARTH 114 consists of 24 one-hour lectures and 9 one-hour tutorials.

Mandatory course requirements

In addition to achieving an overall pass mark of 50%, students must:

- 1. submit one assignment and obtain at least 40%
- 2. submit one essay and obtain at least 40%
- 3. attend at least 6 of 9 tutorials
- 4. sit the final examination and obtain at least 40%

Students must obtain at least 40% in each piece of assessment in order to demonstrate the achievement of all CLOs in the course. Any student who is concerned that they have been (or might be) unable to meet any of the MCRs because of exceptional personal circumstances, should contact the course coordinator as soon as possible.

Workload

The university recommends that 200 hours over the trimester, inclusive of lectures and tutorials and examination preparation, be given to a 20-point course in order to maintain satisfactory

progress, i.e. 16 hours/week.

This includes 24 hours of lecture attendance; 9 hours of tutorial attendance; and an estimated 167 hours spread over the 12 week lecture period and the ensuing examination preparation period.

Assessment

The course is assessed by means of one assignment, one essay and a final examination. The assignment is a short exercise designed to encourage first hand observation of actual works of art. The essay will allow you to range more broadly over the course content. The examination will test your grasp of key ideas and concepts from the entire course and your knowledge of specific works of art. In this way, the assessment should ensure that you have a sound knowledge of as much of the course as possible.

3	The final examination will require you to answer two questions relating to topics covered in the course to establish your knowledge of the material covered and to enable you to demonstrate your understanding of concepts and issues to which you have been introduced. This is NOT an open book examination. Assignment and essay content may NOT be repeated in the exam. Duration: 2 hours.	50%	1,2,3,4	Date & time of exam to be announ ced.

Images from lectures will be available for viewing on Blackboard throughout the course. You are strongly advised to give yourself a regular weekly time to review the images alongside your lecture notes.

Submission and return of work

Assignments and essays should be placed in the art history assignment box in the foyer of Old

Kirk, Level 3 (ground floor). You must attach a *signed* cover sheet with your assignment and essay.

You must also submit an electronic copy of your assignment and essay. To submit an electronic copy via Blackboard, go to ASSIGNMENTS and click on View/Complete under ARTH 114 ASSIGNMENT or ESSAY. Fill in your details and follow instructions to upload your work.

Late assignments or essays should be handed in to your tutor or the Administrator. Your tutors will inform you when marked assignments will be returned. This takes place in tutorials.

Extensions and penalties

Extensions for the essay are possible if you are having serious difficulties completing your work. To receive a short extension, contact the course coordinator by email before the 5 pm deadline. For extensions longer than 3 days, you will have to provide written justification (e.g., a medical certificate, death notice, or letter from a counsellor, etc.). Extensions for the seminar presentations will only be granted in exceptional circumstances and with appropriate written documentation.

Penalties will apply for late work. 5% will be deducted for work submitted more than 72 hours late; a further 2.5% will be deducted for each subsequent day. Work submitted more than 10 days late will not be marked; the work must still be submitted to meet mandatory course requirements.

Late work receives only minimal comments from your marker.

Use of Turnitin

Student work provided for assessment in this course may be checked for academic integrity by the electronic search engine http://www.turnitin.com. Turnitin is an online plagiarism prevention tool which compares submitted work with a very large database of existing material. At the discretion of the Head of School, handwritten work may be copy-typed by the School and subject to checking by Turnitin. Turnitin will retain a copy of submitted material on behalf of the University for detection of future plagiarism, but access to the full text of submissions is not made available to any other party.
