Prescription

Exploration of an area of musical creativity specific to the research interests and activity of an academic staff member, applicable to both instrumental/vocal composers and sonic artists. 2016 Offering: An examination of the main compositional approaches that foreground instrumental timbre in both notated and non-notated music. Featured composers include Sciarrino, Lachenmann and the Spectralists, and others who have explored 'micro-universes' of sound. Students express their research through a suite of creative and analytical projects.

Course content

Course learning objectives (CLOs)

Students who successfully complete this course will be able to:

- 1. compose works that display a disciplined, yet exploratory approach to extended techniques and timbral transformation of acoustic instruments
- 2. analyse the role of timbre and gesture in a selected composition
- 3. prepare a portfolio of materials (e.g., sketches, recordings, plans) that details the exploration of instrumental extended techniques.

Teaching format

This course comprises one 1-hour lecture and one 2-hour lecture per week, and one 1.5-hour workshop per week. During workshops, classes will come together to listen to student performances, as well as presentations by staff and guest artists.

Mandatory course requirements

In addition to achieving an overall pass mark of 50%, students must attend at least 9 of the Composer Workshops held during the trimester of enrolment in this course. Students must attend workshops in order to: 1) develop critical and oral communication skills related to their creative practice, and 2) develop awareness of the contexts, techniques and perspectives related to their creative practice. In the event that the student is unable to attend the Composer Workshop, due to course clashes, the Course Coordinator may substitute an alternative requirement.

Students who are concerned that they have been (or might be) unable to meet any of the mandatory course requirements, because of exceptional personal circumstances, should contact the Course Coordinator as soon as possible.

Workload

A 20-point one-trimester course should require at least 200 hours' work (including class time). This means that during the trimester, the mid-trimester break and study week you should be prepared to spend, on average, 13 hours per week involved in activities such as attending classes, reading, listening to recommended recordings and preparing assignments.

Students are expected to have the appropriate equipment and software for completing their assignments (laptop, notation software, DAWs, laser printer, etc.).

All students will be provided with the *CMPO 305/NZSM 405 Course Anthology* free of charge. INVO students are also expected to own a copy of the *NZSM Guide to Music Notation*.

Recommended readings are listed in the Course Syllabus. All texts are placed on Course Reserve.

It is also strongly recommended that students (especially INVO students) purchase scores to Salvatore Sciarrino's *Sei Capricci* and *Opera per flauto*. These can be purchased online at strettamusic.com.
