PRESCRIPTION

J.M. Coetzee is one of the most highly regarded writers working today. He continues to produce innovative and unsettling fictional work that remains both relevant and challenging. This course offers an opportunity to explore in depth a selection of his critical and fictional works, and some of the critical debates surrounding it.

COURSE LEARNING OBJECTIVES (CLOS)

Students who pass this course will be able to:

- 1. Demonstrate familiarity with the distinctive form and content of all texts studied;
- 2. Demonstrate familiarity with relevant critical concerns;
- 3. Show evidence of having read texts critically, paying close attention to detail;
- 4. Discuss texts comparatively and contextually;
- 5. Synthesise a range of ideas and approaches into a coherent argument;
- 6. Demonstrate familiarity with the conventions of academic writing and ethics.

TEACHING FORMAT

The course is delivered through weekly three hour seminars. Seminar discussions are based on the readings detailed in the seminar programme below. Seminars will be led by the course convenor but with time set aside for class members to introduce the readings.

Each student is required to introduce a seminar, and to circulate to the class, one week in advance of the seminar, an outline of questions for discussion. Presentations are not formally assessed, but they may be taken into account when the final Honours grade is being considered. You should examine the seminar schedule and nominate a topic which you will be prepared to introduce as soon as possible.

MANDATORY COURSE REQUIREMENTS

In addition to achieving an overall pass mark of 50%, students must:

- Attend at least 9 of the 12 seminars (unless otherwise excused by the Course Coordinator) in order to demonstrate their competence in CLOs 1-5.;
- Achieve at least 25% in each piece of assessment in order to demonstrate that they have engaged
 with the course content to at least a minimum standard.

Any student who is concerned that they have been (or might be) unable to meet any of the MCRs because of exceptional personal circumstances, should contact the course coordinator as soon as possible.

The expected workload for a 30-point course is 300 hours over the trimester or 20 hours per teaching week.
