Prescription

This course builds on the knowledge acquired in ITAL 215, with greater emphasis on the use of advanced grammar and syntax in written and oral expression.

Course content

The aim of the course is to improve students' competence in both spoken and written Italian. The teaching of the language is reinforced through written exercises, reading comprehension activities and set assignments (particularly translation). Emphasis is placed on practical work and the development of communicative abilities through conversation and AV activities.

Course learning objectives (CLOs)

ITAL 216 is a one trimester, 20-point intermediate course for students who wish to maintain and develop a solid grammatical base and intermediate fluency in the Italian language (broadly in line with high B1/low A2 level of the Common European Framework of Reference for Languages).

Students who pass this course should be able to:

 understand most of the main points of intermediate-level Italian spoken at reasonable speed and clear written Italian related to familiar matters regularly encountered in work, school, leisure, etc;

- 2. interact and express themselves at an intermediate level with speakers of Italian and deal with a variety of situations likely to arise while travelling or studying in Italy;
- 3. create simple connected written text on topics that are familiar or of personal interest;
- 4. describe experiences and events and give reasonably detailed reasons and explanations for opinions and plans.

Aims:

- (i) to revise and develop intermediate Italian grammar, vocabulary and syntax;
- (ii) to expose students to authentic audio-visual and written materials and a virtual immersive Italian environment, enabling them to use the Italian language in everyday life contexts;
- (iii) to present insights into various aspects of contemporary Italian society, and give students the opportunity to express their ideas and opinions in Italian;
- (iv) to help students think critically and creatively about how to achieve effective communication in a second language.

Teaching format

This course is delivered through two lectures, one tutorial and one AV class per week. The lectures will cover grammatical aspects of the Italian language and the development of written skills, such as written comprehension, translation of texts, and development of advanced written expression in general. The tutorials will focus on the development of oral linguistic skills and the AV classes will aim to develop listening comprehension skills. Both the tutorial and the AV classes will require students' active participation in group exercises or activities.

Mandatory course requirements (MCRs)

In addition to achieving an overall pass mark of 50% students must (unless a specific exemption has been agreed with the course coordinator):

- (i) attend a minimum of 8 of the 10 tutorial/AV classes;
- (ii) submit a credible attempt at the two written assignments;
- (iii) sit the two written tests on the dates indicated;
- (iv) sit the two AV tests at the appointed times;
- (v) do the oral presentation at the appointed time.

These course requirements are related to the course learning objectives and are intended to help students achieve such learning objectives in an effective way.

Any student who is concerned that they have been (or might be) unable to meet any of the MCRs because of exceptional personal circumstances, should contact the course coordinator as soon as possible.

Workload

The University Assessment Handbook has laid down guidelines as to the number of hours per week which students are expected to devote to a course in order to maintain satisfactory progress. In this 20 point 200 hour course, students should expect to work on average 16hours per week including contact hours (contact hours are 3 hours in weeks 1 and 12, 4 hours in weeks 2-11). In the case of ITAL 216, this means an average of 12.5 hours of private study per week outside class time. Please note that some students will find they need to do more than this, especially if they are aiming to achieve high grades.

A possible distribution of this private study time each week would be:

Reading and reviewing class notes, grammatical structures, communicative	40% (5 hours per week, or 60 hours over the trimester)	
functions and vocabulary (including	timester)	
homework exercises)

Written, oral and aural practice (including video comprehension exercises)	25% (a little over 3 hours per week, or 40 hours over the trimester) (Please note that this work is also essential to assessment preparation)
Specific assessment preparation (e.g. weekly writing assignments, oral presentation preparation/wiki contributions, test revision)	35% (a little over 4 hours per week, or 50 hours over the trimester)
