Prescription

A study of the design and implementation of research studies in Applied Linguistics.

Course content

This course explores methodological issues in conducting applied linguistics research, especially research in the area of (instructed) second language acquisition. During the course, we will follow the research process from the formulation of a research question to the research report. Different types of research designs and data analysis will be exemplified and discussed, with an emphasis throughout on the validity and reliability of research methods, and the need for caution in interpreting findings. Students will set up their own small-scale research project, report on its development and give constructive feedback to their peers.

Course learning objectives (CLOs)

Students who pass this course will be able to:

1. synthesize research publications addressing a topic of their interest in the domain of applied linguistics;
2. formulate answerable research questions in response to an unresolved issue;
3. make a justified choice of research methodology to address a specific question;
4. choose/adapt/develop research instruments that suit the purpose of the study;
5. anticipate ways of analyzing the results, and anticipate possible implications of the findings;
6. describe research in a way that accords with EAP customs in our research community.

Teaching format

The course is delivered in two modes: on campus and by distance.

On campus classes are run as seminars and workshops.

For distance students, the course is delivered on-line through <http://blackboard.vuw.ac.nz>.

In both modes, students are expected to take an active role in discussions.

Workload

It is anticipated that students will invest 150 hours in this course, which includes attending classes / contributing to the discussion board on Blackboard, reading the essential and recommended texts, and preparing the assessment items. Probably around 90 hours should be allocated to assessment on the course. Of this, around 30 hours may be required for assignment 1 and around 60 hours for assignment 2.

Assessment

The following table outlines the assessment components for LALS 541:

The criteria for marking correspond to those commonly used in evaluations of research papers (*cf.* LALS 540), most notably: the coherence and clarity of argumentation, the pertinence and answerability of the research questions, the connections with the research literature on the chosen topic, the suitability of the research method and instruments chosen/developed to answer a research question, the appropriateness of the anticipated data analysis, and the logic of the conclusions and implications drawn from findings.

Submission and return of work

All assignments will be submitted through Blackboard (Turnitin), both by distance and face-to-face students. Both assignments should be submitted by midnight (NZ time) on the due date. Feedback on assignments will be sent via email within two weeks after the due date.

Extensions and penalties

No penalty will be imposed if you obtain permission (requested via e-mail) to submit the assignment after the due date. Late work will not be accepted, however, unless prior arrangements have been made with the course coordinator. Also consult the course coordinator (via e-mail) in case your text exceeds the word limit, to be advised whether/what cuts need to be made.

Set texts

Articles to exemplify diverse types of research methods in applied linguistics will be made available on the LALS 541 Blackboard site.

Recommended reading

There are many good manuals for applied linguistics research. One example is: Mackey, A. & Gass, S. (Eds.) (2012). *Research methods in second language acquisition: A practical guide* (Wiley-Blackwell), which contains chapters with guidelines for diverse types of studies.

Further recommended reading will be made available on Blackboard to cater to individual students' needs and interests.
