Prescription

Study of a selected topic in music history. 2016 offering: This course examines music in Germanspeaking lands from around 1600 until 1750. Through close consideration of specific compositions and types of performance, topics of music and society, church and court music, foreign influence, the development of the orchestra, and the growth of public concerts are explored.

Course learning objectives (CLOs)

Students who successfully complete this course will be able to:

- 1. apply appropriate historical and analytical frameworks to the music composed and performed in German-speaking lands from around 1600 until 1750
- 2. convey enhanced understanding of the role this music-making played in early modern German society in a variety of settings (sacred and secular, private and public)
- 3. demonstrate knowledge of the key musical figures, principal musical genres and significant repertoire from German-speaking lands in this period
- 4. employ the methodological skills necessary to carry out effective scholarly research and write persuasively on a topic dealing with music in German-speaking lands, c. 1600–1750.

Teaching format

This course comprises one 2-hour lecture per week and one 1-hour tutorial per week. During tutorials, a graduate tutor will guide students in discussion of course readings and/or set works, or assist with/give feedback on work in progress, where appropriate.

Workload

A 20-point one-trimester course should require at least 200 hours' work (including class time).
