Prescription

Study of selected topics in New Zealand music considered from a range of historical, cultural, or critical perspectives. 2016 offering: An examination of the lives and musical language of each of these three iconic composers, and the impact their music has had on creating national identity.

- 2. identify and explain the social, cultural, geographical, historical and musical environment of a variety of genres of music in New Zealand

Teaching format

This course will be delivered as lectures or in seminar style, with student participation by way of responses to questions about the lecture content and recordings studied in class.

This course comprises one 1-hour lecture and one 2-hour lecture per week.

Mandatory course requirements

In addition to achieving an overall pass mark of 50%, students must:

a) attend at least one Music Forum seminar presentation in the trimester the course is taught. Rationale: This requirement develops crucial skills in listening, engaging with, and critically assessing research presentations. Students who are concerned that they have been (or might be) unable to meet any of the mandatory course requirements, because of exceptional personal circumstances, should contact the Course Coordinator as soon as possible.

Workload

Students are expected to devote 200 hours to this course, comprising 36 hours in classes and tutorials, 12 hours writing journals, 48 hours preparing reading and listening for classes and tests, 60 hours on assignments 3–5, and 44 hours on the final essay.
