## Prescription

This course examines a range of short stories produced by Spanish and Latin American writers in the nineteenth and twentieth centuries.

# **Course content**

SPAN 213 is a second trimester 20-point course. This course provides a first approach to Spanish and Latin American literary studies. It presents a range of short stories, which will be studied in their original versions, produced by Spanish and Latin American writers in the nineteenth and twentieth centuries. In addition, this course aims to give students grounding in basic aspects of literary analysis.

# **Course learning objectives (CLOs)**

Students who pass this course will be able to:

- (i) demonstrate a detailed knowledge and understanding of the short stories studied;
- (ii) discuss these texts in spoken and written analysis;

- (iii) demonstrate knowledge of selected aspects of the literary, political and social history of Spain and Latin America in relation to these texts;
- (iv) demonstrate an understanding of basic tools of literary analysis.

All of the pieces of assessment for SPAN 213 relate to all four of the course objectives.

# **Teaching format**

This course is delivered through two lectures and one tutorial per week. The lectures will present a range of literary tendencies in Spanish and Latin American literature in the nineteenth and twentieth centuries. Students will be presented with the general characteristics of these tendencies and will see how these apply to particular authors and short stories. The tutorials will focus on students' discussing and analysing a set of short stories which will be relevant to the topics covered in the lectures.

# Mandatory course requirements (MCRs)

In addition to achieving an overall pass mark of 50%, students must:

 attend a minimum of 8 out of the 10 tutorials of SPAN 213. The Spanish and Latin American Studies Programme considers it essential that students attend this proportion of tutorials as these provide an interactive environment where an important part of the learning in the course will take place.

Any student who is concerned that they have been (or might be) unable to meet any of the MCRs because of exceptional personal circumstances, should contact the course coordinator as soon as possible.

#### Workload

In order to maintain satisfactory progress, students are expected to dedicate approximately 200 hours to a 20 point course; that is, on average, 13 hours per week including contact hours over the course of the trimester- i.e., in the case of SPAN 213, **10 hours of private study outside class time**. Some students may wish to do more than this, especially if they are aiming to achieve high grades. A possible distribution of this time each week would be:

Class and tutorial attendance 3 hours
Reading and reviewing class notes 4 hours
Tutorial preparation 2 hours
Study for tests and reading for essays 4 hours

#### Submission and return of work

Detailed guidelines for the presentation of essays will be distributed with the essay topics. Marked work will either be returned in class or be made available for collection from the SLC office. Please bring your student ID card with you when you come to collect your work. The Programme aims for a maximum two-week turn around in marking and returning students' work.

Short extensions may be granted by the Course Coordinator for particular assignments if requested in writing prior to the hand-in date. Longer extensions will require appropriate supporting documentation. The Course Coordinator should always be contacted on or before the due dates if there is a problem.

## **Penalties**

The due dates for essays and seminar reports must be adhered to. The penalty for work presented late without prior approval is a 5% deduction per day. In addition, please note that up to a maximum of 5% may be deducted for poorly presented essays.
