Prescription

This course explores the ways in which a second language curriculum is designed and developed to provide relevant learning goals, effective learning opportunities in different contexts, and assessment of how well the opportunities have been taken up and the goals have been achieved. It also examines the social and cultural impact of language education policy, and the role of English in the world today.

Course learning objectives (CLOs)

Students who pass this course should be able to:

- 1. Evaluate the design of an existing course and justify decisions to adopt or adapt it
- 2. Apply language curriculum design principles to systematically design a short course with limited goals
- 3. Provide leadership and advice to others involved in designing a language course
- 4. Understand the relationship between the language classroom and wider society
- 5. Appreciate issues relating to English in the world

Teaching format

The approach will be 'lectorial' – a combination of lecture and tutorial activities.

Mandatory course requirements

In addition to achieving an overall pass mark of 50%, students must:

- a) Hand in both tasks and the assignment
- b) Achieve over 25% on the in-class test
- c) Attend all tutorials or complete written tasks for any tutorial missed

Any student who is concerned that they have been (or might be) unable to meet any of the MCRs because of exceptional personal circumstances, should contact the course coordinator as soon as possible.

Workload

Each week you should allow 7 hours for required reading, and 3 hours for class attendance. The remaining 80 hours of the expected 200 hours for this 20 point course will be assessment-related.
