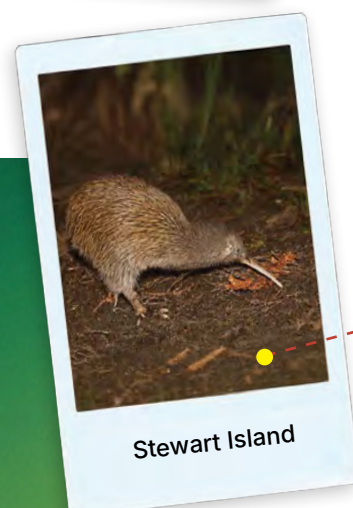

TE MARAE O TE HERENGA WAKA

Ngā Mokopuna is our new marae-based learning, teaching, research, and engagement hub. Our university's marae is a place where hui (meetings), āhuareka (celebrations), educational workshops, and other important events happen in Māori culture.

Ngā Mokopuna—meaning 'descendants' in te reo Māori—reflects our commitment to nurturing future generations. It builds on the aspirations set nearly 40 years ago by former staff and students and will shape the future for new taura (students) and kaimahi (staff) coming into the space.

It is a transformative learning and teaching space that fosters Indigenous knowledge and innovation to solve pressing societal and environmental challenges. The marae complex includes open spaces, study areas, teaching and seminar rooms, offices, and a wharekai (dining room).

Our marae is a place of learning where Māori students and staff can immerse themselves within their culture. It is also a place where international students and the broader university community can 'moor their waka' (connect) and find a sense of belonging.

You'll have the opportunity to engage in workshops, events, intercultural experiences, volunteering, student leadership, and more.

Pathways to our university

If you have not yet met the English language requirements for your programme, our English for Academic Purposes programme can help develop your English and academic skills for entry.

English for Academic Purposes Programme

Our English for Academic Purposes (EAP) programme caters to undergraduate, postgraduate, and advanced postgraduate study. Our highly qualified teaching staff will help develop your English language and academic skills for study at university.

We offer a 12-week programme. This will be full time and will take 20 hours per week. Our EAP programme will help you improve your academic reading, writing, speaking, and listening. You will develop a range of critical- and creative-thinking skills as well as learning strategies.

Once you successfully finish the EAP programme, you will receive a Certificate of Proficiency in English (CertEnglProf). Getting this certificate means you can then go on to pursue further study at our university. This can be either undergraduate or postgraduate study, depending on your scores in the EAP programme. Your EAP results will be accepted as an alternative to IELTS or TOEFL by Victoria University of Wellington and most other New Zealand universities.

The programmes start in February, June, and September.

Foundation Studies

Let us help you prepare for undergraduate study. If you don't meet our minimum entry requirements, our Foundation Studies programme is an alternative entry pathway into a Bachelor's degree. Victoria University of Wellington offers its own foundation programme and accepts many foundation programmes taught by other institutions.

Our partners at UP Education provide a path to undergraduate-level study by offering successful students guaranteed entry into our undergraduate programmes.

The programme delivers the building blocks you need to study at Victoria University of Wellington:

- learn academic reading and writing
- learn about academic integrity; for example, APA referencing
- learn presentation skills and meet new friends in group projects
- develop skills in critical thinking
- learn independent study skills.

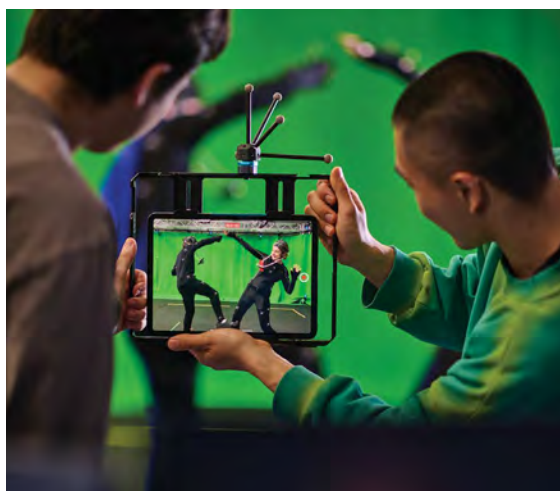

FEES

Tuition fees are calculated on a per-point basis, so the amount you pay will depend on your choice of courses. Other fees per year cover student support services such as careers guidance, counselling, financial advice, health services, student advocacy, student publications, and student representation. Some programmes may incur additional costs, such as field trips or thesis publications. Tuition fees for PhD study and research are charged on a per-year basis, and international PhD students are charged at domestic fee rates.

INSURANCE

All international students must have appropriate medical and travel insurance while studying in New Zealand. When you accept your Offer of Place at the University, you will be automatically signed up to a comprehensive insurance plan provided by Studentsafe Inbound University. The Studentsafe insurance policy covers your medical bills (with some exceptions), loss or damage of your personal belongings, personal liability, and some other unexpected costs relating to your travel.

The insurance plan can be paid with your fees. If you already have medical and travel insurance, or wish to purchase an alternative policy, it is essential that you check this with Te Haumiri—International Student Experience first.

LIVING COSTS

SCHOLARSHIPS

Victoria University of Wellington provides a range of scholarships that recognise and encourage high achievement and leadership. They are available for international students at all study levels:

- Tongarewa International Scholarship of up to NZ\$10,000 (for international students who completed secondary school outside New Zealand)
- International School-Leaver Excellence Scholarship of NZ\$20,000 (for international students who completed secondary school in New Zealand)
- Manaaki New Zealand scholarships funded by the New Zealand Government and available to students from eligible countries.

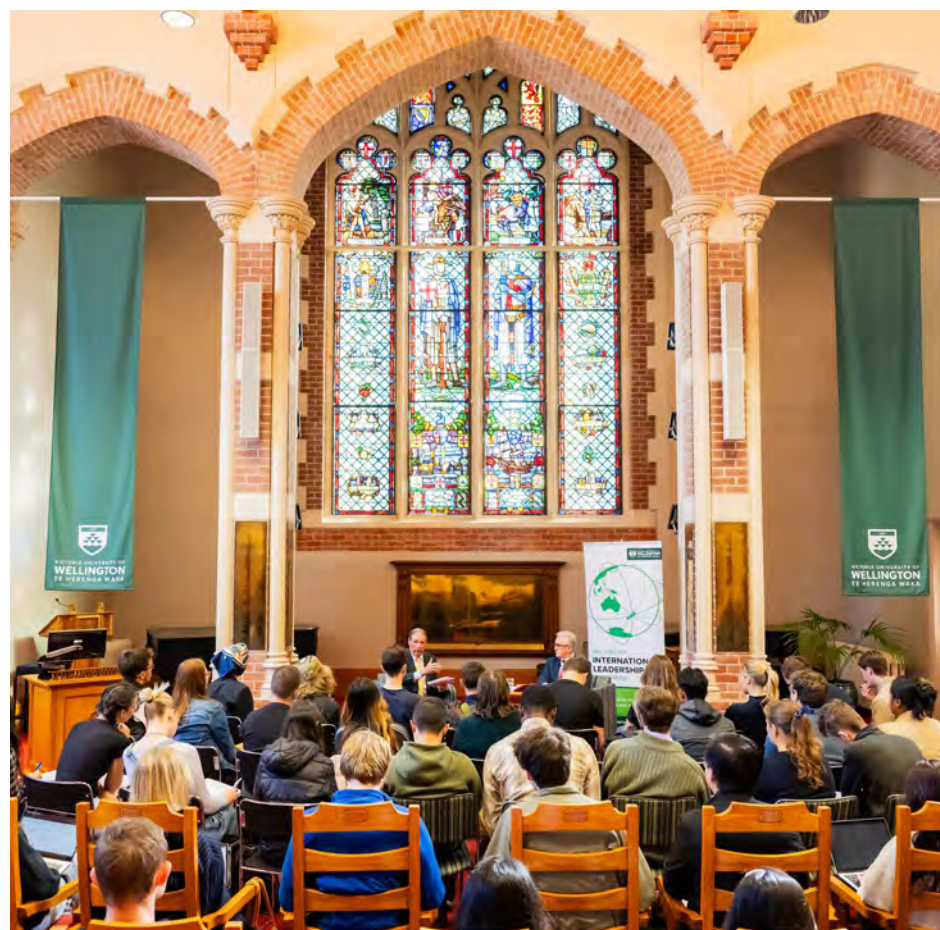
GRADUATE ENTRY REQUIREMENTS

Graduate certificates and diplomas require a New Zealand Bachelor's degree or equivalent.

POSTGRADUATE ENTRY REQUIREMENTS

You need a Bachelor's degree with at least a B average unless stated otherwise in the programme's minimum general entry requirements. A background in a particular subject area or extensive relevant work experience may be required. Students with equivalent international qualifications from a recognised institution are encouraged to apply. If you have achieved university entrance qualifications and have a sufficient level of English proficiency, but would like to develop your ability further, you may wish to include the following degree-level courses in your programme of study:

- WRIT 151 Writing in English as a Second Language—this course aims to develop the writing, reading, and study skills of non-native speakers of English
- WRIT 251 Academic Writing in English as a Second Language—this course helps students develop an awareness of what constitutes effective writing and reading in academic contexts.
