NZs first Chief Coroner Judge Maclean reflects on the first four years of his role including how the vision of the Law Commission Report in 2000 was reflected in the Coroners Act 2006 and in practice. He will also discuss recent overseas developments in this area.

Carol M. Rose is the Ashby Lohse Professor of Water and Natural Resource Law at the University of Arizona Rogers College of Law, and the Gordon Bradford Tweedy Emeritus Professor of Law and Organization at Yale Law School. Professor Rose's research focuses on history and theory of property, and on the relationships between property and environmental law. Her writings include two books, Property and Persuasion (1994), and Perspectives on Property Law (3rd ed. 2002, with R.C. Ellickson and B. A.Ackerman), and numerous articles on traditional and modern property regimes, environmental law, natural resource law and intellectual property. She has degrees from Antioch College (BA Philosophy), the University of Chicago (MA Political Science, JD Law), and Cornell University (Ph.D. History), and an Honorary Degree from the Chicago Kent College of Law. She is on the Board of Editors of the Foundation Press and a member of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences.
