

The Urgency Project reports

The use of Urgency by the New Zealand House of Representatives is a topic of considerable current interest and concern.

In the most extensive study ever conducted into this topic, the Urgency Project (Claudia Geiringer, Polly Higbee and Professor Elizabeth McLeay) have created a database of every use of urgency by the New Zealand House of Representatives between 1987 and 2010. They also interviewed a number of past and current members of Parliament about what factors motivated them to use urgency, and what factors constrained them from doing so. On 9 May, they report on their findings. They will discuss what urgency is; how much it is used and why it is used; if, why and in what circumstances we should have concerns about its use; and what reforms could be made to better regulate its use.

The Urgency Project was conducted under the institutional auspices of the NZ Centre for Public Law, and the Rule of Law Committee of the NZ Law Society. It was generously funded by the NZ Law Foundation.
