Speculative Ecologies: the aim was to understand the critical relationships between an existing physical context and an atmospheric/climate based energy system, with a view to students designing their projects around performance criteria extracted from an aspect of ecology. Parametric software was used in many cases to simulate and represent these complex relationships. The design studio ran 6 streams with a heavy digital focus.

LAND 212 has been run this trimester in conjunction with LAND 212 (drainage and grading) using the site and brief for the proposed Children's Garden at the Wellington Botanic Gardens. In particular the studio focuses on the creation of space using plant material, ground modelling and the use of simple structures.


Kathryn Moore will examine the implications of a new definition of theories of perception for policy and practice in landscape architecture. HS2LV is a proposal to transform the High Speed 2 (HS2) rail link, the UK's largest infrastructure project for generations, from a linear engineering project into an iconic landscape infrastructure that would be a catalyst for wider social and economic transformation. It represents a unique opportunity to create an enduring legacy by placing the landscape at the core of the project. Thurrock Garden City uses a similar holistic and integrated approach to build confidence, aspirations and inspire a new way of working to achieve radical change in a borough that has until recently been regarded as an impoverished dumping ground for London.
